Billericay's New Fishing Lake

The creation of the new fishing 'bays' along its north side are yet another example of the interests of the minority prevailing over those of the majority. No doubt Basildon Council wanted the extra income from fishing permits. Fishing bays are now placed in the only open spaces between bushes along two of the lake's three sides, obstructing the view across it and destroying the aesthetic. The benches, placed to take advantage of that view, have been made redundant; on Saturday my view was only of the rear of two large brown fishing tents placed 'illegally', not in a fishing bay but on the green sward behind it. It has now become a fishing lake around which people are allowed to walk and a cash cow for the Council.

A New Draft Plan

Basildon Council has released details of a new Draft Local Plan to cover the 20 years from 2023 to 2043. We do need a Plan, but the current proposal would bring decades of chaotic degradation.

The intention is to meet the new government housing need target of 27,100 dwellings in full – this includes around 10,000 on brownfield and 17,000 on what is now protected Green Belt.

The borough's population would grow by 65,000 by 2043 – more than the current populations of Billericay and Wickford combined. The Draft Plan is extremely vague at this stage – but it appears to be proposing around 5,300 houses between the Railway Line\Norsey Wood down to the A127.

Targets

Basildon's true local housing need could be met without using Green Belt.

- Official government projections (from the Office of National Statistics – ONS) show Basildon requires 450 houses per year (9,000 over a 20 year Plan Period. 300 per year of this is the needs of local people, with the rest to allow for in-migration from the capital to continue at recent rates. But this scientific approach is not the basis of government Housing Target algorithms.
- Under the spell of the rich and powerful development lobby, the old government's contrived algorithm inflated the ONS figures to 1,040 per year (20,800 over twenty years).

This would rapidly accelerate in-migration to the area.

• The new government have put that on steroids, with a target of 1,355 per year (27,100 over twenty years).

Worse still, the new government has made it much harder, perhaps impossible, for Green Belt LAs to undershoot these targets as they could before. Communities all over the country face mounting pressure from developers - with even those with an adopted Plan being required to review their Plans to meet these unjustified new targets.

Recent History

In March 2022 the Council withdrew the draft Local Plan (covering 2014 to 2034) in order to protect more of the borough's Green Belt. Since then, the twelve Billericay sites that were to be included in the old Plan were at elevated risk at appeal until a draft new Plan was in place. Two sites were successfully defended at appeal, two lost and another approved by the Basildon Planning Committee.

We now have a new draft Plan to cover the period 2023-2043. We had hoped that the new draft Local Plan would undershoot the governments advisory Housing Targets and so use little or no Green Belt. But the government's planning reforms have changed everything.

Affordability and Viability Viability

You'd think that a hyper-supply of housing would have the silver lining of lowering house prices, helping people to buy their own home. But experience in many places shows this has little or no effect.

The country's housing stock has grown faster than the population. We probably have enough, and probably build enough homes, but they're in the wrong hands. More and more of our housing stock is being bought up by investors, making demand almost infinite and pushing up prices. And it should be noted that neither the last, nor the current governments actually want house prices to fall.

Our borough does need more Council houses for social rent but we haven't seen any indication of this so far.

To be fair, the Plan includes a requirement for 50% "Affordable" homes on Green Belt sites. Good in theory, but the term "Affordable" is a misnomer. Affordable Homes are discounted just 20% from the astronomical market rate.

Worse still, developers will be able to wriggle out of building "Affordable" homes, citing "Viability". Viability is the government guarantee that the development cartel is entitled to a 20% profit per site – with the developer doing most of the accounting.

How to Help

The situation is very bad, but it's too soon to despair. It will be several years before a Plan is adopted, and the situation will evolve a great deal in that time. As a community we must do all we can to shape the borough's future for the better. We need as many people as possible (individuals not households) to engage with the process and respond to the consultation which runs until January 12th.

The best way to stay up to date is to join the **"Save Billericay** from Housing Developments" Facebook group that's run by BAG. Information will also be posted on the Billericay Action Group website – https://www. billericayactiongroup.org.uk/

- IF3 Green Lane Plotlands, south of Little Burstead

AS1 and AS2 in north Billericay are "Alternative Sites" that may be added as the plan develops.

New housing\employment areas would also extend northward from Basildon.



Litter Group Celebrate 5 Years of Keeping Billericay Tidy! by Karen Sinclair

ere at the Billericay District Residents' Association, we would like to say a huge thank you and congratulations to the excellent Billericay Litter Pickers who celebrated their 5th Anniversary on the 20th November, and in true community spirit they celebrated... you've guessed it, with a litter pick! (see pic below). With over 1,410 volunteering hours/55 litter picks and the collection of over 600 sacks, equivalent to approx. 2.5 tonnes of litter, under their belts this is certainly no mean feat!!

So where did it all start, we hear you ask. Brainchild of Billericay resident Jon Gibbon, the group was formed to help make Billericay a better place to live. Jon has a penchant for all things rubbish, dating back to his days working for 'Keep Britain Tidy' where he managed the survey team, which involved him touring the UK monitoring litter and giving advice to local councils. In 2017 Jon decided to start litter picking himself on the way home from the station, which led to his wife and children joining in. A few years later Jon and his wife founded the group. Since then they have organised many outings on the streets and green spaces of the town to pick up rubbish and keep Billericay looking tidy. They also aim to protect wildlife by keeping the area clean and tidy and promote environmental issues such as climate change. With over 700 followers on Billericay Litter Pickers Facebook page the momentum is really growing! Reaching kids is a vital part of the group's ethos; they have achieved this by partnering with local associations such as the Scouts, Beavers, Girls Brigade, Guides, the Duke of Edinburgh Award and the Rotary Club and also by allowing and encouraging children and families on the litter picks.

Speaking about the permanence of litter in the local community co-founder of the group Vikki Gibbon stated: When we first started there was a lot of historic litter but now, we are finding there is less litter in places like Lake Meadows but other areas and streets are pretty consistent with the amount of litter we are collecting. Gas canisters and



vapes, however have become more prevalent.'

Local businesses such as Crocus Wealth and the Moir Health Osteopathy and Sports Massage Clinic support the group by helping with sponsorship and their insurance. They are also supported by Basildon Borough Council and Billericay Town Council.

'Active Essex' point to litter picking as having far wider benefits for participants than just cleaning up the community, these include social, mental and physical benefits. They state: "Not only are you serving your community by helping provide clean and safe environments it

also allows you the opportunity to meet likeminded individuals and create a sense of community and wellbeing. The physical benefits are plentiful, you are on your feet and actively travelling around your area which improves peoples' physical activity levels and their step count, without even thinking about it."

If you would like to help spruce up your surroundings, you can join on a one-off or regular basis, or even bring a group along! Meeting dates are usually on a Saturday or Sunday for about 1.5 hours. Anyone is welcome to join the group's Facebook page Billericay Litter Pickers', where upcoming litter picks will be advertised.

Which reference to some front gardens that have been converted to a car park; this can be a controversial subject. Apart from ensuring that such coverage does not increase the risk of flash flooding by use of a porous material or the introduction of a drainage system, there is no regulation in place (that we are aware of) preventing such a makeover.

Property owners have a right to do so but nevertheless our Street Scene greenness is being reduced. Now that our young folk are generally staying longer at home because of the lack of availability of local housing stock and the difficulty faced by first time buyers to acquire a mortgage, households can have several cars. We have moved into an era when the design of housing estates of yesteryear were never designed to allow for such an increase in population density as there is today and their original design concept has been compromised. Front gardens as we have known them, with their green and well-

tended plots with perhaps a tree, shrubs and a lawn that help to provide shade in hot weather and offer a niche for wildlife, are now in retreat as coverage by concrete and paviours becomes ever more prominent. And the use of artificial grass is viewed by many as a retrograde step! Where a stretch of several of these paved-over front gardens occur side per side, it can represent a stark view especially when graced with their Wheelie Bins standing as if alien sentinels in a row! With inventive design, such makeovers could have included both a horticultural patch and also allow for



additional car parking. That is, both worlds could be have been addressed. But do our local landscaping companies encourage that option? The Mayor of London may launch a scheme whereby property owners will receive funding to

revert their paved over front garden back to greenness to avoid the risk of flash flooding, enhance biodiversity and visually improve the streets. Could there be a similar incentive launched in Billericay?





Uring the past month, the Friends have been working closely with Jan Tutton, one of our members, who herself keeps bees and who is Vice Chair and Membership Secretary of Chelmsford Beekeepers. a division of Essex Beekeepers Association (EBKA).

The British Beekeepers' Association, known as BBKA, was established in 1874 as a London-based club, but quickly grew to include the rest of the country, as well as Ireland; Scotland and Wales forming their own associations. The Chelmsford division was established in 1918 to encourage beekeeping as an occupation for those returning from the war.

Today, the BBKA represents around 30,000 beekeepers across the country, and works to support education around honeybees, while actively campaigning to raise awareness of threats to pollinators.

To celebrate 150yrs of the BBKA, Chelmsford Beekeepers and the BBKA have jointly funded the planting of a tree in

Lake Meadows. All member Associations and Branches throughout the country have had the opportunity to plant one.

A very special tree has been chosen - a Tulip tree (Liriodendron tulipifera) particularly because bees love the nectar produced by the unusual flowers, which appear in June and July. It is a most unusual and attractive large tree which has received the RHS Award of Garden Merit. Its distinctive unusual foliage is bright green, turning clear yellow in autumn. Honey bees, bumblebees and many other species depend on trees for food. The Tulip tree is a rich nectar source at a period traditionally known by beekeepers as 'the June gap' which occurs when there is a dip in forage for honeybees.

So, keep your eyes open for the new tree, which you will find on the north side of the park, near the flower meadow. Hopefully this and the other BBKA trees will last well into the future, perhaps even another 150 years!

Finally, once again we should like to invite people in Billericay to

come and join us for Carols in the Park this month. The annual event will be held on Saturday December 14th, assembling near the Bowls Pavilion at 3.30pm for mince pies and mulled wine, and carols from 4pm. The event is free, but please bring a torch and some cash for the collection.

A Closer Look at Tax Adjustments in the Autumn Budget

he Autumn Budget generated significant speculation about potential changes to Inheritance Tax (IHT) and Capital Gains Tax (CGT). Here, we examine the key points discussed in relation to these taxes.

The Chancellor's comments on IHT focused on a "balanced approach," with current allowances remaining and frozen until 2030. Those are the taxfree allowance of £325,000 on all estates and an additional residence nil rate band of £175.000 for those passing residential property to their descendants with an estate of under £2,000,000. The tax rates, with the standard being 40% on any assets above those thresholds, remain unchanged.

The standard IHT rate of 40% on assets above these thresholds also remains in place. Unused allowances can still be transferred to spouses and civil partners, preserving a combined IHT-free allowance of £1.000.000.

There was no mention of lifetime gifts in relation to IHT, suggesting the current rules will remain. However, CGT rates will rise from 10% to 18% for standard rate taxpayers and from 20% to 24% for higher rate taxpayers.



Additionally, Business Property and Agricultural Property reliefs will be adjusted from 2026, making 50% of qualifying assets over £1,000,000 taxable.

A significant change for many is the announcement that inherited pensions will be included in estates for IHT purposes starting in 2027, effectively returning to the pre-2015 approach. This change will impact many estates and requires careful planning, as pensions were previously excluded from estate calculations.

There is no one-size-fits-all advice at this stage. We always encourage clients to review their estates after any major life changes or, in any case, every few years to ensure their wills and tax planning through trusts, gifts, and other means are working most efficiently in the given circumstances and accurately reflect their intentions.

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Billericay Striders 10K Road Race was back with a vengeance and lots of smiles for its 27th running this year after having to cancel the day before last year due to unsafe conditions at the ford. Running conditions were perfect: dry but cloudy and not too chilly for standing around at the start and with very little wind..

First place in the men's race went to Road Runner's Paul Whittaker, who ran the race in 30.01 which was a course record and earned himself £100 and a special Striders' Salver. He also took home an extra £100 for breaking his own course record set in 2015 by exactly 30 seconds. In second place was Adam Hickey of City of Southend on Sea in 30.16 (which also beat the previous course record) and in third Jim Dodsworth of Leigh on Sea Striders (33.54). Jim also picked up the prize for Vet 40.

The women's race saw Lindsay Coleman win again this year - who also scooped the V40 award. Consistent achiever

Stephanie Migliorini of Leigh on Sea Striders came second and third place went to City of Southend's Juliette Le Mare.

The Male Youth Award for young runners under 21 years old was won by Billericay local Lucas Sanchez in 39 minutes and the Female award was won by Jemima Knightsbridge of Brentwood Beagles in 44.57. The Women's Team Award went to Phoenix Striders and the Men's to Leigh on Sea Striders.

The club has already been overwhelmed with messages of thanks and compliments on social media for the excellent organisation and the support given throughout by the marshals.

The club would like to thank its long-term sponsors Ground Control and Fisher Jones Greenwood. We had a new sponsor this year, Fairfield Farm crisps, and they were very well received by runners and supporters alike. Run Active also generously donated spot prizes and gave vouchers for the winning teams.

The club charity this year is Prostate Cancer UK which was supported by our favourite coach Keith Walker who sadly passed away earlier this year. There was a moving moment at the start line where all the runners were asked to show their appreciation of Keith's tireless efforts with the club.
