Annual General Meeting

he BDRA AGM, was held on the 21st May 2025, at The Most Holy Redeemer Church, thank you all those who were able to attend. The draft minutes will be available on the website within the next couple of weeks.



The speaker for the evening was Professor Almond, Deputy HM Lord-Lieutenant of Essex, a resident of Billericay, who gave a very interesting talk about the history and work of the Lord Lieutenants. For those of you who were unable to attend, you may be interested to know that the term Lieutenant dates back to medieval times and is made up of the term "Lieu" which is "instead of something" and "tenant" who is someone

who holds a piece of land on behalf of someone else. It was Henry VIII who initially wanted some Lieutenants who could act on his behalf to raise a militia to protect and look after his interests. One of the first people whom he chose was Lord John Petre, Baron of Ingatestone who became the first Lieutenant of Essex.

Later when Edward VI came to the throne, he decided to put Lieutenants in every county. Cromwell after the Civil War dissolved the Lieutenancies, but they were later restored after the Reformation. They were once again appointed to assemble local militia to defend the counties, for the Crown. In 1907 the role changed where they became responsible for the reserve forces. The 1974 a new role was defined where Queen Elizabeth II appointed Lord Lieutenants for each county to represent and promote the interests of the Crown. The Lord Lieutenant is currently appointed by the Sovereign after a selection process from the Cabinet Office. The Lord Lieutenant is then able to appoint deputies which are appointed based on their interests, experience and areas of expertise with the final appointment being made by the Chancellor of the Duchy of

Essex currently has 50 Deputy Lord Lieutenants. It is an honouree unpaid, apolitical position. Their role is to organise visits by members of the Royal Family and to help promote their charitable interests. They also present medals and honours to local people particularly the British Empire Medal. The current Lord Lieutenant of Essex is Jenny Tolhurst who is one of the first women to be appointed.

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STATEMENT ON PLANNING DECISIONS

any of you will know that there have been several planning applications approved this year as being on grey belt land. This land was historically part of the Green Belt and in many cases was of prime agricultural quality. This has come about by Basildon Borough Council (BBC) applying the latest Government planning guidance through the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF).

We have been very much aware of resident concerns about the erosion of our Green Belt so the Billericay District Residents' Association (BDRA), with support from the Billericay Action Group (BAG), commissioned No.5 Barristers, who are experienced and knowledgeable in planning law and in application of the NPPF. The purpose of this commission was to study the actions of BBC in approving the planning applications to determine if they acted appropriately. As a result, the council's latest Green Belt Study was also taken into consideration as it was a material part of those decisions.

In summary, the barrister's view was that the council's actions were lawful and that any legal challenge (Judicial Review) was unlikely to be successful. The barrister also deemed that the Green Belt Study was a thorough piece of work done by a reputable company and as a matter of planning judgement is not something that canbe challenged from a legal perspective.

Clearly this is not the outcome that many of us may have wanted but it provides some clarity where there was previously a degree of uncertainty over what BBC had done.

However, the barrister did provide some encouragement to contest the Local Plan at the 'Examination in Public' stage next

year. This is something that the BDRA and BAG had always planned to do.

Whilst it is looking increasingly difficult to make objections on Green Belt terms alone, we believe that it is still important for residents to express their views and concerns on planning applications and the Local Plan, as there are many other aspects that should be highlighted based on our local knowledge, such as infrastructure and the environment.

BAG will continue to provide advice and guidance, and we will do our utmost to ensure that we get a good outcome from the Local Plan by making representations at the examination.

We are also looking into instructing a transport consultant who will be able to help us at the examination stage in terms of the transport infrastructure.

There has been a substantial cost to the actions already taken by the BDRA andfuture costs will be significantly higher when we require the experts to prepare for, and participate at, the examination. The importance of defending Billericay from at least the worst excesses of the Local Plan is one of the main reasons why the BDRA exists. This is why we need the continued support of our members and the continued level of financial supportthrough the membership

subscriptions, which will enable a thorough defence of the Local Plan to be undertaken.

PLANNING APPLICATION UPDATES

The two planning applications below, have been recently submitted to Basildon Borough Council, the period for the public to comment, will have closed by the time you receive this magazine.

Potash Road

There was a planning application for 49 houses on Potash Road, near the Goatsmoor Lane junction. This is close to the large site where a Planning Inspector rejected an appeal last year.

The site is almost certainly Dormouse habitat and may well be part of the "Battle of Billericay" battlefield from the Peasant's Revolt of 1381. As everyone in the town knows, Potash Road is especially ill-suited to support housing growth

Greens Farm Lane

310 houses were proposed at Greens Farm Lane, this will narrow the vital, but already tenuous wildlife corridor between Mill Meadows nature reserve and the wider countryside. The developers are not proposing a new nature reserve as they did at one time.

Heath Close

23 houses, 30 sheltered accommodation (awaiting decision)

In addition to these planning applications, we are aware that there are early plans for another 1,100 houses on Dunton Road, 1,100 east of Southend Road, 200 on Tye Common Road and 350 at Outwood Common Road. If all are approved, we will see a total of over 5,000 new houses built between the A127 and Billericay, Although not in Billericay, Noak Bridge, which had 400 properties approved, not started yet, will impact residents accessing the A127 or services in Basildon.

These developments will be mainly on Green Belt land, now classified as Grey Belt. No mention of infrastructure. Our Town will be changed forever.

Club History

Photofold Camera Club was established in 1980, but it wasn't the town's first photographic club. The earlier club was formed in 1951 but closed due to dwindling numbers. Our club meetings were originally held in Billericay Arts Association premises, firstly, in a building that was demolished to make way for Waitrose Car Park, and then in The Fold's premises in Laindon Road. Beginning 2021/22, the club moved to a larger meeting hall at the Chantry Centre, just off the High Street. The club is thriving today with over 70 members, their experiences covering both film and digital mediums, encompassing Sports (including support to Billericay Town Football Club), Landscapes, Macro and Portrait.



Residents Rise Up Against Local Plan!

Part 3

In 1381 Billericay was a hamlet just within the north-west boundary of Great Burstead. Situated atop a ridge where two trading routes crossed at Sun Corner, it was both prosperous and important. Everywhere the King's army had suppressed the Peasants' Revolt. Now it was Billericay's turn.

Wat Tyler was dead, the King had reneged on all his promises to the people, but the Essex rebels would not abandon their struggle without one last effort. A summons was issued to attend a general mobilization at Galleywood and Rettendon Commons. Messengers covered the county and men marched to the assembly points, gathering horses and tools enroute. On 27th June as many as 5,000 in the Rettendon and Galleywood contingents made camp in the angle between Norsey Wood and Forty Acre Plantation, giving them a clear view westward.

The rebels dug ditches around their camp, chained carts together, and staked the perimeter. Their weapons were bows and rusted daggers, scythes, sickles and staves. Around their camp-fires they raged against injustice in their lilting Essex accents and determined to defend

their new-won freedoms. They did not even bother to post sentries.

Meanwhile, on 26th June, the vanguard of the King's army under the Earl of Buckingham and Sir Thomas Percy rode into Billericay. Almost immediately, the escaped Thomas Ledere of Billericay was apprehended, "indicted and beheaded", probably on Sun

Corner. They then sought the rebels' whereabouts. Just before dawn on Friday 28th June 1381 the King's army charged the rebels' encampment from the northwest and, in one fell swoop, broke through the unguarded entrenchments, smashed the flimsy barricades, and began to slaughter the rebels. Undisciplined peasants were no match for

war-horses and men-at-arms with spears, axes, and swords. They broke their barely-formed ranks and the battle became little more than a rout. Those who stood were cut down. Many fled into Norsey Wood, which the King's army had surrounded, and were hunted down. Some grouped themselves into the old East Saxon fighting-rings and made an orderly retreat towards Ramsden Heath, beating off their attackers, picking up stragglers, and retiring like true soldiers. About 500 were killed, buried in the churchyard at Great Burstead.

Fugitives fled to Colchester where in vain they sought support: then on to Sudbury hoping to join the men of Suffolk. Instead, they found the county pacified. Royal forces attacked and routed them: the survivors escaped to Huntingdon,

but were chased away. Their last stand was at Ramsey Abbey: twenty-five were slain and the rest dispersed, becoming outlaws.

Jack Straw and the captured John Ball were interrogated and executed. The archbishop-slaying John Starlying surrendered and was executed. John Geffrey, who had led the men of Great Baddow from its churchyard to Norsey Wood "was indicted for felonious treason", came "before the lord king at Chelmsford...and was there drawn and hanged." Many were executed; many were

outlawed. At Chelmsford and Colchester it is recorded that men were sentenced to death in batches and, in the streets of Essex towns, disembowelling and hanging continued briskly.


And the silent witnesses to these events? Peasants bound for London to right the wrong of the poll tax passed before St. Mary Magdalen's brick tower in the High Street. Sun Corner frowned on Thomas Ledere's execution. Shamefaced, Norsey Wood's foliage hid the slaughter of Billericay's sons, caught like rats in a trap.

These articles began by alluding to Basildon's Local Plan. So should they end with it. Ignoring the results of public consultations, our mean-spirited, sanctimonious central government obliged faceless local government servants of the state, with no sense of responsibility or duty to those they serve, to impose unwanted, unnecessary, sweeping change to our town. By what right do they do so? By what contract have we, the townspeople, granted them permission to ride roughshod over our heritage? Why do we allow it? We, their paymasters, deserve better.

When put to the test, our 1381 forebears were not found wanting. But now, the gage of freedom, beaten from their clenched fists, has been picked up for another fight.

Although Thomas socialised at many local and county events, attending dinners, balls and military parades, he evidently seldom spoke and his wife was very rarely seen with him. He was known as 'the squire of the town', whilst Mary

The men digging the lake were said to be out-of-work farm hands having returned from the Crimean war. Eventually the Moat, as it was known, was dug, although not to the original 'S' shaped design, and it was stocked with a great variety of fish. Ducks and Geese flew in and Major Spitty was able to invite his special guests to see his magnificent new creation for his shooting parties.

Thomas Jenner Spitty died on January 26th. 1898 and his wife in 1908. Both were buried at St Mary Magdalene church at Great Burstead, where there is a memorial to them in the nave. After his death, Hurlock's was bought by architect Aloysius Pole, who lived there until just before WW2, when the house was purchased by the London Co-operative Society. It was used during the war, first for housing officers and then troops, and afterwards as a WRVS furniture store. It was demolished in 1958, when the Coop built a supermarket on the site, followed later by the present Blue Boar public house.



He and his wife Mary Ann Carter, who was the youngest daughter of the local doctor, Dr William Carter, were married at Christmas 1863. Thomas was ten years older than her. They lived across the High Street from the doctor at a large house owned by Thomas, known as Hurlocks. About a year after the marriage, an announcement in the Times stated that twins had been born to the happy couple. The following week another announcement was made saying it had been a mistake and there were in fact no twins! It had all been a 'mischievous fabrication'!

Ann was sometimes called 'the autocrat of the little town', taking an active part in town-life and organising sewing parties in their coach house, making clothes for poor London children.

Hurlocks was originally the oldest house in the town, although a modern Georgian front had been added during the late eighteenth or early nineteenth century. Thomas had a belvedere or gazebo built on the roof, to which he used to escape from his wife. He could see right down to the Thames to watch out for ships invading England. If he looked in the
