Community Pastors

Ommunity Pastors are local Christian volunteers, in a strong relationship with all local Christian churches. The Pastors operate on the principles of compassion, care, and community engagement.

Their base is at the Community Hub in the High Street. It has been quite a journey getting to their current premises and progressing their dreams. They were based at St Mary's Church for around 12 years pre covid, but knew that they wanted to move to the High Street area where they could provide a safe space for people. At the same time the Billericay Food Bank was also outgrowing its premises and there was an opportunity of moving the 2 community groups together into one empty property in the High Street. This was enabled by some generosity from the premises landlord together with help from the local Rotary. Club. Billericay Foodbank has since moved to larger premises.

It was their intention when they moved to the Community Hub to be able to invite people into the Hub. Unfortunately, a serious fire at the premises in April 2024 caused extensive damage and their plans are currently in limbo whilst insurance issues are sorted out. Hopefully these will be resolved and they end up with the safe place they aspire to.

Meanwhile, a dedicated team of volunteers still patrols the streets offering a listening ear, practical assistance and a reassuring presence to those who may find themselves in challenging situations. People may not need specific help but if they are feeling vulnerable at that moment the Pastors will stay with them giving them reassurance until they are ready to move on, or someone such as friends or family comes to pick them up.

They deal with anything from 5-10 people every week, but while out in the town they also make about 200 casual contacts where people acknowledge the positive impact of their presence and stop for a chat. The hub is always open when they are patrolling, they greet people on the street as they pass, and if they see someone who they believe needs support they approach them. If they feel that someone needs more help in dealing with difficulties in their lives, they will point them to other appropriate agencies and charities. They also work closely with local authorities, emergency services and licence holders to contribute to the overall safety and well-being of our community. They operate in and around the High Street, including the railway station on Friday and Saturday nights, between 19.00 - 23.00 hours, but are thinking of extending this to 1am. They are not the Police but help to maintain a safe and a positive atmosphere in our High Street and are part of the answer in helping to keeping our High Street and surrounding area and the night time economy a safe place for a good night out

Residents Rise Ap Against Local Plan! Part 2 Julian Whybra

By the 15th June 1381 the rebels' leader Wat Tyler had raised the whole of south-east England, gained control of Essex and Kent's main towns, and marched two armies to London. Sympathetic Londoners opened the gates and London was captured. England's rulers were bottled up in the Tower of London; and the Revolt was spreading nationwide. Tyler commanded the peasants' total allegiance and had largely been able to control their actions; and they had all taken a loyal oath to the King. Not wanting to alienate Londoners, he had issued stern warnings against looting; they "had not come for personal gain but for the commonweal."

Despite its name, the Revolt did not just involve peasants but tradesmen, skilled craftsmen, priests, free tenants and farmers, as well as 'administrators' such as reeves, tax-collectors, constables, and even a few landowners. Some 10,000 Londoners joined the rebels. One was goldsmith Thomas Faringdon, one of the Essexmen's leaders. He certainly had business dealings in Essex and may have come from there originally. Criminals freed from prisons, including Roger Forster from Billericay, joined the rebels.

There were targeted killings of poll-tax officials, their homes and offices were set ablaze, and their contents destroyed. Lawyers were particularly singled out, as

were Flemings, regarded as bloodsucking merchants or exploitative manufacturers living off England's wealth. Tensions ran high: John Wiltshire of Little Burstead "freely and without compulsion lopped off the head of a certain squire called Grenefeld". Wat Tyler settled an old score with a former master by killing "a rich man called Richard Lyon" who had once beaten him. John Starlyng of Great Warley boasted he had executed the Archbishop of Canterbury.

The King agreed to all the rebels' demands and to end feudalism; he met Tyler on the 15th at Smithfield to settle the details. However, Tyler was lured into a trap, cut down, severely wounded, and promptly executed.

The King and his Council quickly reasserted their power and revoked all concessions previously granted. The leaderless rebels in London were corralled and dispersed. Some were executed, Faringdon was imprisoned, others went on the run.

The Revolt in London was over but not in Essex. John Geffrey (East Hanningfield) organized an attack on the Bishop of London's manor, Crondon Park near Stock; property was burnt and goods stolen. William Cole (Ramsden Bellhouse) and Robert Stoleman (Downham) led their villagers to attack the Countess of Hereford's manor at Ramsden Bellhouse. William atte Stable (Downham) with others destroyed the manor-house and stole livestock at Barn Hall, Downham. John Hose, Rose Cartere, Margaret and Peter Castelyn, Emma Edward and twenty-one other Hutton tenants attacked the Abbot of Battle Abbey's manor in Hutton. John Ingelond with other Downham villagers attacked the King's mother's manor at Barstable Hall, Basildon. John Caumpe and William Osbern of Ingatestone, among others, destroyed the Knights Hospitaller's manor-house in Fryerning, committing arson and theft. The list goes on.

Attacks petered out as news arrived of the London debacle. The King's army, seeking retribution, prepared to advance into mid-Essex.

ake Meadows is rather a special place to many local residents and so it was to a certain Major Thomas Jenner Spitty in the 1800s. He had a vision for these lands that have made it the place that we all love so much. His father Captain Thomas Spitty bought the estate in 1831, after it had belonged to generations of the family of the Lords Petre of Yngeatte-Stone, since 1539, after the manor was bought from King Henry VIII in 1539. Rooms and Great Burstead school although he did not, as some suggest, give the park to the town.

For three hundred years, local tenant farmers had worked the land, grazing their cattle, keeping a few sheep and hens and struggling to grow corn and a few root vegetables on the difficult yellow London Clay. A little stream ran down through the fields to a small lake, where watercress grew freely. The fields were edged with hedges and oak trees, and had names such as Hither Hilly Meadow, Rushy Meadow and Rushy Hoppit. Even, to this day, we can pick out some of those field



In the 19th century, small pockets of land were sold off by Lord Petre and there were several different owners. In 1831 at a London sale, a Captain Thomas Spitty bought 39 acres of Hill House Farm, later adding more pockets of land until he had acquired 117 acres in all. When he died in 1858, he left the lands to his son, Major Thomas Jenner Spitty, who was a magistrate and local JP, later becoming Deputy Lieutenant and High Sheriff of Essex. He was a great benefactor to the town in many ways, founding the Reading

boundaries by the remaining old oak trees.


Major Spitty owned a number of other large estates in Essex and used to entertain many people in high places, including, we hear, Horatio Kitchener, the 1st Earl Kitchener. He used to enjoy holding wildfowl shooting parties, particularly on his Bowers Gifford estate, where he had an extensive lake. He also wanted to show off his property at Billericay, so ordered a lake to be dug on his Hill House Farm estate.

He employed out-of-work farm labourers, who had returned from fighting in the Crimea, and was supposed to have paid them a shilling a day, equivalent to the Poor Law payments, and fed them a good meal, in return for their hard work. The lake was originally supposed to be 'S' shaped but for some reason it was never completed, either because he ran out of money, which is doubtful judging by his wealth noted at probate or because the workers got fed up with digging! He did not live at the farmhouse but at the largest house in the town, known as Hurlocks where he had a belvedere on the roof, from which he could watch the men digging his lake. If he saw a man leaning on his shovel, he would immediately go down to the lake and give the man the sack!

The Major died in 1898 and the estate and farmhouse passed to other people including his niece. Much of the land continued to be farmed into the 20th century, although small pockets were sold for housing and the farmhouse was sold separately to the farmland. Nearly 100 years ago, in 1934, the chairman of Billericay Rural District Council, Cllr Harry Bebington and his fellow council members agreed to purchase the farmland, as a public amenity for the people of the town. On Saturday July 11th, 1936, the park was officially opened, followed by a fete enjoyed by the crowds. It was the start of what was to become a very special place for the residents of Billericay.







t's time to remind everyone about Billericay Striders' ever-popular 10K road race in 2025, which this year will be held on Sunday 6th July. This is our first summer date. We are trialling a summer race due to having to cancel the race in 2023 due to dangerous conditions at the ford.

The race is largest sporting event in Billericay and is


contested by Essex elite athletes, fun runners and first timers – all are welcome.


